


Living Maps Publication

Naked Humanity

We discussed the challenge of creating an accurate picture of the past, and how to facilitate respectful and productive conversations about uncomfortable history.

For Art's Sake

For Art's Sake is a London-based podcast initiative that aims to show the difference museums can make to people's lives.

We were invited on for Season 2 to share our work in the heritage sector, especially the Ashmolean Museum. We discussed **how the city itself is a curated space**, with labels, misinterpretations, and hidden information which needs to be uncovered.

Death At Tea Time



During the nation-wide **Being Human festival**, we collaborated with the Wellcome Centre for Ethics and Humanities to co-host a 'Death Café' style-event, titled *Death at Teatime*.

Tables invited participants to compose imaginary epitaphs, to think through the implications of end-of-life ethics, and think about **how stories of historical deaths are used socially and politically**.

With over 80 participants - it was a great day with some deep conversations!



Activism Cafe

Our last open event of the year took place at the **East Oxford Community Center**. It showcased many Oxford-based activism groups, in particular the *Afrikan Caribbean Kultural Heritage Initiative*, *Common Ground*, and the *Oxford Climate Justice Campaign*. The aim was to offer **a space to discuss what sorts of activism exist in Oxford, past and present**.

The event was drop-in, allowing anyone to come for a chat about activism over a cup of tea or coffee, and biscuits.


Museum Collaborations
